Annualrent found due from the date of a bill payable at sight and accepted without a new date. (See Dict. No. 5. p. 477.)

CREDITORS of Sir John Douglas against Lady Douglas.

No. 10.

LADY DOUGLAS, on her infeftment of annualrent, was found preferable on certain sums deposited by some dragoons, for grass mail for pasturing their horses in the parks of Sir John Douglas her son, to Sir John's creditors, who had arrested the money, notwithstanding she had no decree of poinding the ground. *Vide* February 14, 1733, M'Gill of Rankeillour against Real Creditors of Hay of Naughton, *voce* COMPETITION.

1750. June 14. CREDITORS of COCKBURN of Langtoun.

No. 11.

BYGONE annualrents on an infeftment of annualrent, not affectable by inhibition. *Vide* INHIBITION.

1750. June 22. Muirhead against Magistrates of Haddington.

No. 12.

An agent's accounts found not to bear annualrent, not even for his debursements, though as old as 1731.
