ROAD TRAFFIC

The A1(M) Motorway (Junction 59 to Junction 60) (Temporary 50 Miles Per Hour Speed Restriction) Order 2013

Made - - - *25th July 2013*

Coming into force - *4th August 2013*

WHEREAS, the Secretary of State for Transport, being the traffic authority for the A1(M) Motorway and connecting roads, in the County of Durham, is satisfied that traffic on that motorway should be restricted because renewal of filter drainage works are proposed to be executed thereon:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Secretary of State, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 14(1)(a) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984(a), makes the following Order: -

1. This Order may be cited as the A1(M) Motorway (Junction 59 to Junction 60) (Temporary 50 Miles Per Hour Speed Restriction) Order 2013 and shall come into force on 4th August 2013.

2. Subject as mentioned in article 3 of this Order, no person shall, during a period of 10 hours starting at 20:00 hours on Monday 5th August 2013 and ending when the said works have been completed, cause or permit any vehicle to be driven at a speed exceeding 50 miles per hour in the A1(M) Motorway northbound carriageway from a point 2500 metres south of the nose of the northbound exit slip road at Junction 60 (Bradbury) northwards for a distance of approximately 2200 metres.

3. The provisions of article 2 of this Order shall apply only during such times and to such extent as shall, from time to time, be indicated by traffic signs and shall not apply to a vehicle being used for police, fire and rescue authority or ambulance purposes, or anything done at the direction of, or with the permission of, a constable.

4. No speed limit imposed by this Order applies to vehicles falling within regulation 3(4) of the Road Traffic Exemptions (Special Forces) (Variation and Amendment) Regulations 2011(b) when used in accordance with regulation 3(5) of those Regulations.
